New Testament authors cited these Psalms in connection with Jesus.


How To Spot a Messianic Psalm


- They speak of the Messiah, "the anointed one".
- They are forward-looking prophecies expressing hope for a righteous King.
- They describe aspects of Jesus' ministry: suffering, kingship, salvation, judgment, justice, eternal rule, and universal implications.
- The New Testament cites many of these, giving us the right interpretation.
- They articulate an unfilled longing for God's rule and reign to fill the earth.

Psalm 2

Main Idea: Humanity is in rebellion against God. He has sent his son to save rebels like you and me.

vss I-3: The voice of rebellious men

vss 4-6: The voice of King in heaven

vss7-9: The voice of the King's son

vss I 0- I 2: The voice of wisdom presents the choice before each of us today.

Anthropomorphism:

is the Biblical attribution of human traits, emotions, or physical characteristics to the description of the infinite God as a way for finite creatures to understand Him.

... but the Lord laughs at the wicked, for he sees that his day is coming.

—Psalm 37:13
